

# Keeping Town Centres Safe

Summer Plan 2025

### What does the evidence tell us?

Cornwall is the **second largest local authority area** in the Southwest, covering an area of 3,559 km², and has the longest coastline of all English counties at 697 km. It is an area of **many contrasts**; with varied landscapes including remote rural, coastal and environmentally sensitive areas, interspersed with villages and historic market towns, where affluence sits alongside **some of the most disadvantaged areas** in England.

Consistent with elsewhere in the UK, **crime rates are highest in our main towns** and concerns about community safety are high on the public agenda. In the last year **55% of recorded crime** took place in our town centres and **61% of reported ASB**. Crime and ASB rates are more than 2x higher than in rural areas.

Around **17% more crimes** and **a third more anti-social behaviour incidents** are reported to police in the summer months in Cornwall. Seasonal factors (lighter nights, warmer weather), the school holidays and large-scale events such as festivals **contribute to a summer rise in disorder**. This increased demand is more prevalent in **coastal towns and tourist hotspots** and is largely predictable.

#### **Problems in town centres are complex**

Many of our larger towns have seen a visible increase in **anti-social behaviour**, more **rough sleeping**, **street drinking** and more **groups of people** on the streets. We have seen a shift to **more anti-social behaviour during the daytime** which impacts on the wider community and feelings of safety in public spaces.

The **night-time economy** has not returned to pre-pandemic levels of activity.

After a long period of year on year reductions, we are now seeing **a rising trend in anti-social behaviour reported** to the police.

In the 2024 Have Your Say Survey, residents told us that their quality of life is affected by rising **anti-social behaviour** and other issues in their local area. **They feel less safe** and fear of crime has increased.

**Experiences and views differ** from one area to another but residents in several areas felt very strongly that problems had significantly worsened in their town.

A **decline in public confidence** is a contributory factor in under-reporting of anti-social behaviour and low level crimes. Negative perceptions are further amplified through adverse narratives and misinformation on **social media**.

**Drug use and dealing has become more visible** in communities, especially class A drugs. The threat from drug-related **Organised Crime Group activity has increased**. Young people and adults are being **exploited** through County Lines and 'cuckooing' of addresses.

Despite **focused efforts from partners** and investment in local initiatives through the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and the Home Office, there is a **public perception of little action** being taken.

Nationally thefts are rising, particularly **shoplifting**. Local trends, however, appear to be increasing at a **steeper rate**. Some towns are disproportionately affected. Retailers are also reporting more **anti-social behaviour and abuse** towards staff.

**Other types of theft continue to reduce**, including robbery, theft from the person and vehicle-related thefts.

Low level violence, stalking and harassment and public order offences have increased. Although trends in more serious violence are reducing, we have had a small number of serious events involving weapons that have had a 'signal' effect on communities, driving up fear of crime.

### Our place-based approach

Cornwall has **15 towns and one city** with populations above 10k, and **each one is different** in terms of the population profile, the types and intensity of needs (including the extent to which they are affected by summer tourism) and local assets and resources.

The <u>Safer Towns</u> Programme was developed by the Community Safety Team to **respond to local needs and priorities** and focus resources on the people and places that need it most.

There are **ten Safer Towns** across Cornwall – Penzance, Camborne and Redruth, Falmouth, Truro, Newquay, St Austell, Bodmin, Saltash and Liskeard. The ten towns were chosen because they experience the **highest levels of crime and anti-social behaviour**, alongside complex issues around drugs, alcohol, rough sleeping and safeguarding vulnerable people.

Each local partnership **brings together the public sector and local services**, elected members, voluntary and community organisations and local businesses. Led by Community Safety Officers, partners work together to deliver **creative and locally-led solutions** and demonstrate partnership working at its best.

**Annual Town Profiles** are provided to each Safer Town partnership to help **shape local action plans** and this is combined with community intelligence to identify and agree local priorities; this creates a **strong sense of ownership** and supports a vibrant problem-solving approach. Information on local trends and risks is shared on an ongoing basis through the Amethyst Community Safety Intelligence Team.

The **Safer Towns partnerships are able to respond quickly** as new risks and challenges emerge with stepped-up intensive support – including extra patrols and public drop-ins, public reassurance and communications, outreach support, drug-related litter response, CCTV use and dynamic information sharing and risk management. We deploy all of these tactics during the summer peak.

Cornwall Council's **place-based ASB Casework model** is embedded within the Safer Towns Programme, providing local knowledge and support to tackle complex and persistent ASB. The team of ASB Caseworkers, each with a designated geographical 'patch' includes **three dedicated town-based officers** for Penzance, Truro and Camborne that are funded by the town/city councils, with a small contribution from Cornwall Council (80/20). The ASB Team work closely with the Neighbourhood Policing Teams and are co-located in police stations.

**Cornwall Council's Anti-Social Behaviour** (ASB) team is dedicated to investigating incidents of ASB, **placing victims at the core** of our community efforts. Our focus is on the people affected by ASB or involved due to their social circumstances. We **emphasise changing behaviours** by setting clear boundaries for those causing ASB and **providing support to those affected** by their actions.

Our approach to addressing ASB involves partnership **collaboration**, enhanced **victim contact and support**, and active **community engagement** to boost confidence and resilience.

We **prioritise early intervention** to prevent escalating behaviours, directing individuals to supportive services and utilising non-legal remedies such as voluntary warnings, Behaviour Contracts, and Community Protection Warnings and Notices. Legal enforcement measures, such as Criminal Behaviour Orders or closure powers, are considered when appropriate and necessary.

- The ASB escalation process provides a framework to identify persistent perpetrators of ASB and provide a response to that behaviour. It makes use of early and informal interventions and legal remedies. It is a systematic process and has three minimum requirements. Verbal warning, written warning, multi-agency meetings.
- **Early and informal interventions** In many cases, there are underlying causes of the anti-social behaviour. The ASB powers allow professionals to actively deal with these using positive requirements. However, there is no need to wait until formal court action before offering help. Substance misuse or alcohol dependency can drive anti-social behaviour and low-level crime, and support can have a positive impact. Catching someone before they fall

into a criminal way of life by supporting them to escape addiction can save thousands of pounds in enforcement action over a person's lifetime.

- Referrals to other agencies No single agency can tackle all the issues
  which concern communities. Effective use of support services. Parenting
  programmes, drug or alcohol treatment, counselling, mental health services
  or educational support are powerful ways to help individuals change and
  manage their behaviour.
- Mediation service Devon & Cornwall Police work closely with the Devon Mediation Service (please note that despite the name this service also covers Cornwall) to provide mediation for neighbours who have fallen out. Issues are many and varied but include car parking, noise, behaviour, boundary disputes etc.
- ABCs The individual may agree to stop specific behaviour that has been causing disruption to the community; or positive requirements such as engaging in a community group, attending school regularly or attending a local youth diversion scheme.

The Community Safety Team ensures that every town has a **named ASB Caseworker and Community Safety Officer**, including those outside the Safer Towns Programme. These roles work closely with and complement the Neighbourhood Team and Sector Inspector in each area.

Each Safer Town has ASB as a priority theme, with associated actions, within the Safer Town Delivery Plan. These multi-agency plans, alongside the Town ASB Target Groups, will support and dovetail with the developing local ASB Action Plans (one of the police requirements of the Neighbourhood Policing Guarantee).

### The Safer Cornwall Town Centre Summer Plan 2025

The Safer Cornwall Town Centre Summer Plan 2025 is presented under 4 headings:

- Intelligence-led, targeted approach to improve community safety
- Young people supported and diverted from involvement in ASB and crime
- Meaningful consequences, that balance enforcement with support
- Residents are well-informed and engaged in what we're doing in their area

As well as considering the needs of the town centres, the Safer Cornwall Summer Plan extends to beaches and coastal hotspots.

Specific areas of focus requested:

- **Anti-social behaviour:** police recorded incidents, public experience of ASB in the local area, public perceptions of ASB as a problem in the local area
- **Retail crime**: Shop theft, Robbery of business property, Assaults on retail workers (data not yet available)
- **Street crime**: Theft from the person (snatch theft, stealth theft, attempted snatch or stealth theft), Robbery of personal property.

• **Public perceptions** of crime as a problem in the local area and repeat victimisation.

There is a requirement for Devon and Cornwall Police to report back to the Home Office on **police use of the following powers**:

- Criminal behaviour orders
- Community protection notices
- Civil injunctions
- Dispersal powers
- Closure powers
- ASB case reviews
- Respect orders (not yet available)

These metrics alone would provide a very limited picture regarding the impact of the plans. To complement the police metrics, the ASB Team will provide information on safeguarding actions and referrals for support, as well as warnings and de-escalations, for those in the process. We are working with other service providers to make best use of the information that they capture on their work, including those providing outreach and diversionary activities for young people over the summer period.
